

## University of Leeds admissions, registration and degree classification: breakdown by disability

The following comparative student data provides information by disability category on:

- the university's admissions processes: the number of students who applied for an undergraduate / postgraduate course, the number of students who were offered a place, and the number of students who accepted a place to study at Leeds.
- the number of undergraduate postgraduate students who actually registered to study at Leeds
- the degree classification of students completing their undergraduate course.

Please note:

- all information is for the academic periods 2010/11 and 2011/2012
- the ' % of total ' figure is calculated from the total of known disability (i.e. unknown data has been excluded)
- the data has been separated for home/EU and overseas applicants and students (figs 4,5 &6)

Key headlines from the data on the university's admissions process home/EU students (fig 1) include:

- 6% of applicants (5% taught postgraduate 2011/12) declared a disability. A slightly higher percentage of undergraduate applicants who declared a disability were offered a place (63% 2010/11, 61% 2011/12) than non disabled applicants (61% 2010/11, 58% 2011/12)
- A higher percentage of undergraduate applicants with a declared disability accepted an offer (31% both years) than those who declared no known disability (26% both years).
- A similar pattern is evident in the taught postgraduate and research postgraduate admissions process.

Key headlines from the data on the university's registration process home/EU students (fig 1) include:

- The same percentage of students who declared a disability (8%) registered for an undergraduate course in 2010/11 and 2011/12. This is a similar percentage for taught postgraduate (7% 2010/11, 6% 2011/12) and research postgraduate (7% 2010/11) registrations.

Key headlines from the data on the university's degree classification process for home/EU students (fig 3) include:

- 82% of students with a declared disability were awarded a 1<sup>st</sup> or 2.1 degree compared to 79% who declared no known disability.

Key headlines from the data on the university's admissions process for overseas students (fig 4) include:

- There was a lower percentage of overseas applicants with a declared disability (1%, apart from 2011/12 taught postgraduates where this was 0%) than home/EU applicants with a declared disability (6%, 5% taught postgraduate 2011/12)
- In 2010/11 a similar percentage of undergraduate applicants who had declared a disability were offered a place (61%) compared to those who had declared no known disability (59%). This was similar in 2011/12 (although the percentage of applicants offered places had dropped to 54% and 56% respectively).
- A higher percentage of those offered an undergraduate place had declared no known disability (21% 2010/11, 17% 2011/12) than those who declared a disability (10% 2010/11, 15% 2011/12)
- However, a higher percentage of taught and research postgraduates who had declared a disability accepted places than those who had declared no known disability
