

University of Leeds admissions, registration and degree classification: breakdown by gender

The following comparative student data provides information by gender on:

- the university's admissions processes: the number of students who applied for an undergraduate / postgraduate course, the number of students who were offered a place, and the number of students who accepted a place to study at Leeds.
- the number of undergraduate postgraduate students who actually registered to study at Leeds
- the degree classification of students completing their undergraduate course.

Please note:

- all information is for the academic periods 2010/11 and 2011/2012
- the ' % of total ' figure is calculated from the total of known gender (i.e. unknown data has been excluded)
- the data has been separated for home/EU and overseas applicants and students (figs 4,5 &6)

Key headlines from the data on the university's admissions process home/EU students (fig 1) include:

- a similar percentage of male : female students applied, were offered a place, and of those offered accepted a place on an undergraduate and post graduate degree for both academic years 2010/2011 and 2011/2012
- 58% of students who applied for an undergraduate degree in 2011/2012 were female, of those 57% were offered a place, and of those offered, 29% accepted
- in comparison 42% of students who applied for an undergraduate degree in 2011/2012 were male, of those 60% were offered a place, and of those offered , 23% accepted

- the same percentage of female: male students registered for an undergraduate course in 2010/2011 and 2011/2012 (60%:40%)
- there is a change in the percentage of female: male students registered for a research post graduate course in 2010/2011 (46%:54%) and 2011/2012 (48%:42%)

- 82% of female students were awarded a 1st or 2.1 degree in 2010/2011 compared to 75% of male students

Key headlines from the data on the university's admissions process for overseas students (fig 4) include:

- 51% of overseas students who applied for an undergraduate degree in 2011/2012 were female, of those 55% were offered a place, and of those offered, 18% accepted. There is a similar pattern for overseas male students
- In comparison, 33% of overseas students who applied for a research postgraduate degree were in 2011/2012 were female, of those 29% were offered a place, and of those offered 45% accepted

Key headlines from the data on the university's registration process for overseas students (fig 5) include:

- The same percentage of female: male students registered for an undergraduate course in 2010/2011 (49%:51%) and 2011/2012 (50%:50%)
- There is a change in the percentage of female: male students registered for a research post graduate course in 2010/2011 (39%: 61% and 2011/2012 (42%: 58%)
