

# University of Leeds Registered Students 2018/19 by protected characteristic

The following data provides information on all students (Undergraduate (UG), Taught Postgraduate (PGT) and Research Postgraduate (PGR)) who registered during the academic year 2018-19. Data is provided by the following protected characteristics: age; disability; ethnicity; gender; religion or belief; sexual orientation and caring responsibility.

For the **EU/Home** cohort 23,366 UG students (22,669, 2017-18), 3,080 PGT students (3,079, 2017-18) and 1,690 PGR students (1,761, 2017-18) registered during the 2018-19 academic year. For the **overseas** cohort 3,414 UG students (2,864, 2017-18), 4,433 PGT students (3,444, 2017-18) and 827 PGR students (781, 2017-18) registered during the 2018-19 academic year.

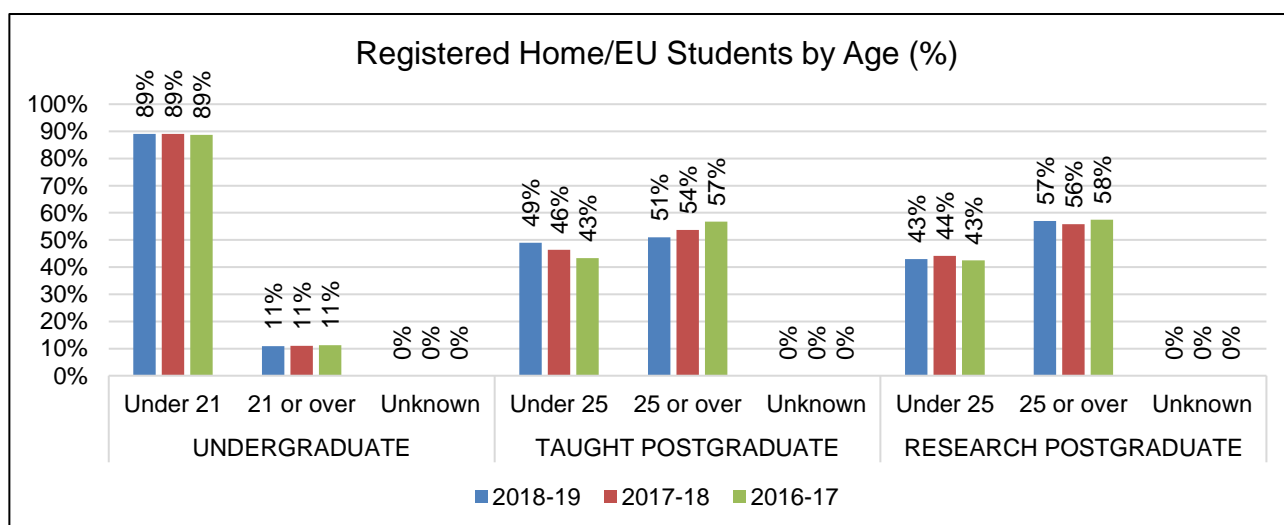
The previous two years of data are provided for comparison. Please note that whilst numbers of students by protected characteristic remain the same as published in previous years, the percentages have changed. This is a result of unknown data now being included as a percentage of total student numbers.

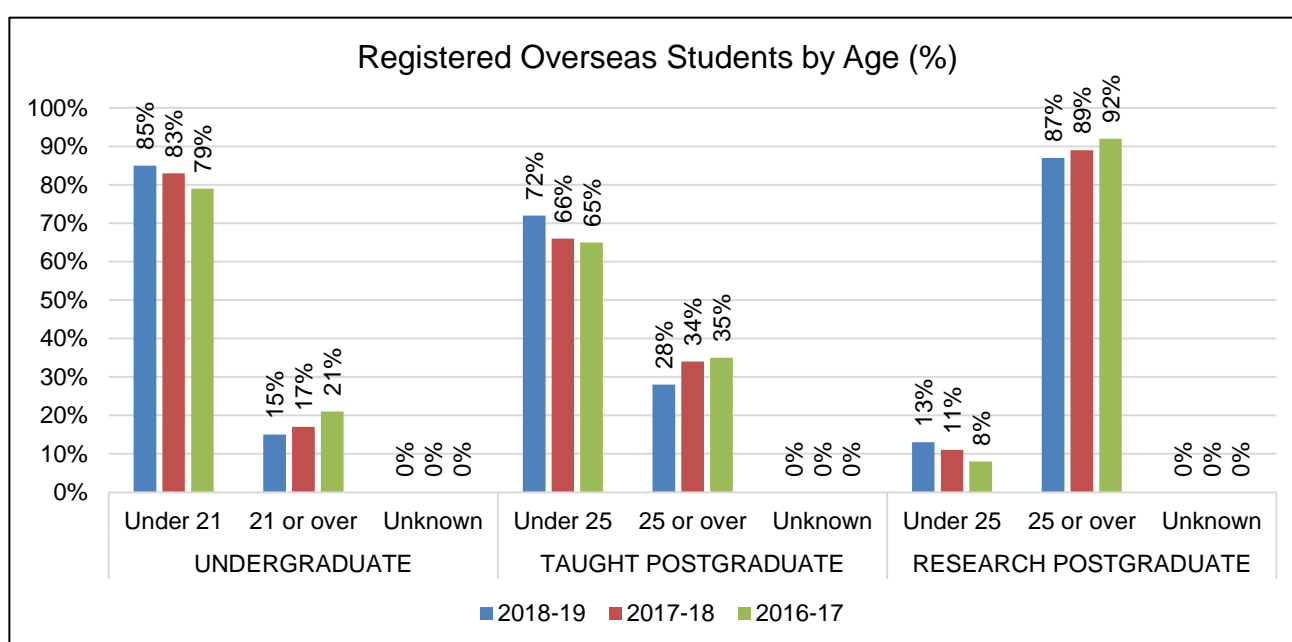

### Commentary

- i. Undergraduate - The age split of Home/EU UG students had remained static over the three year period with 89% of registered UG students under the age of 21 and 11% aged 21 or over.
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - The percentage of Home/EU PGT students under the age of 25 has increased over the three year period from 43% in 2016-17 to 49% in 2018-19. There has been a corresponding decrease in the percentage of PGT students aged 25 or over (57% in 2016-17 and 51% in 2018-19).
- iii. Research Postgraduate - The percentage of Home/EU PGR students under the age of 25 is the same for 2018-19 (43%) as for 2016-17. The percentage of PGR students aged 25 or over appears to have decreased over the three year period from 58% in 2016-17 to 57% in 2017-18, but this will be a result of rounding.

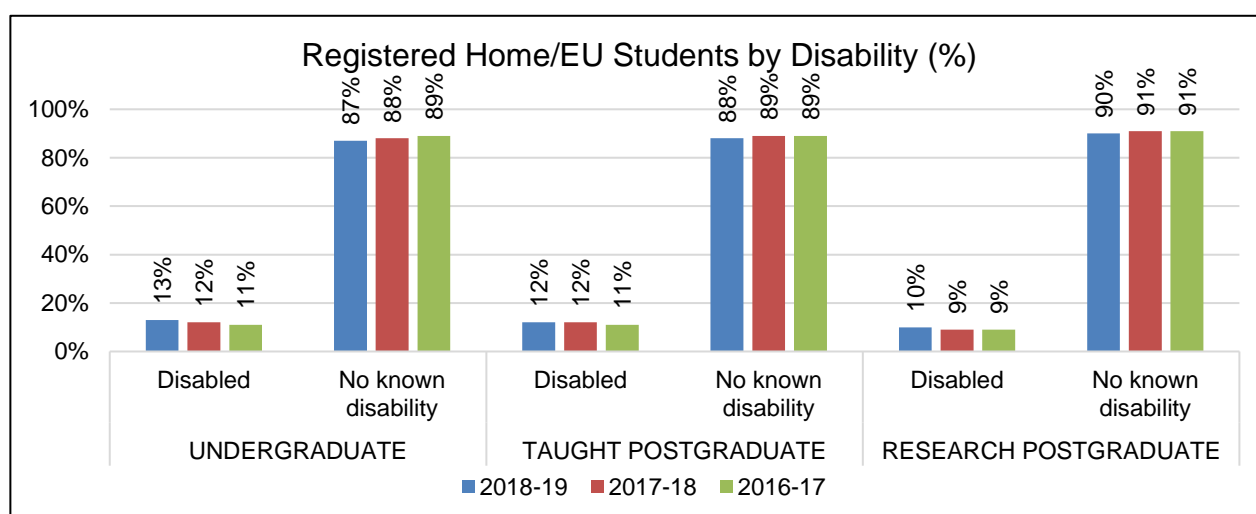

### Commentary

- i. Undergraduate - The percentage of overseas UG who were under 21 has increased over the period from 79% in 2016-17 to 85% in 2018-19. There has been a corresponding decrease in the level of UG students who were 21 or over (21%, 2016-17 decreasing to 15% 2018-19).
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - There has been a 7% increase over the three year period in the percentage of overseas PGT students who were under 25 (65%, 2016-17 increasing to 72%, 2018-19). There has been a corresponding decrease in the level of PGT students who were 25 or over (35%, 2016-17 decreasing to 28%, 2018-19).
- iii. Research Postgraduate - The percentage of registered overseas PGR students who were under 25 has increased from 8% in 2016-17 to 13% in 2018-19. There has been a corresponding 5% decrease over the three years in the percentage of PGR students who were 25 or over.

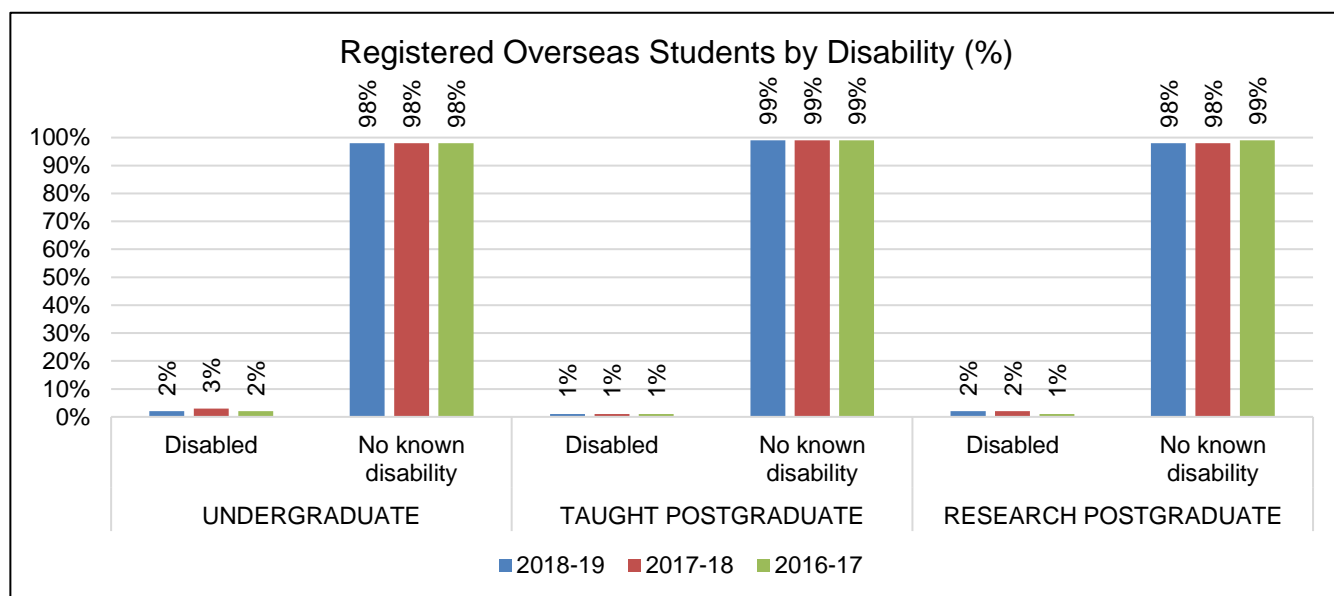

### *Commentary*

- i. Undergraduate - The percentage of Home/EU UG students who have declared a disability has increased from 11% to 13% over the three year period. The largest percentage increase (1.8%) has been in those declaring a mental health condition, such as, depression, schizophrenia or anxiety disorder.
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - There has been a 1% increase over the three year period in the percentage of Home/EU PGT students who declared a disability (11%, 2016-17 increasing to 12%, 2018-19).
- iii. Research Postgraduate - There has also been an increase in the level of Home/EU PGR students who declared a disability. (9% 2016-17 increasing to 10%, 2018-19).

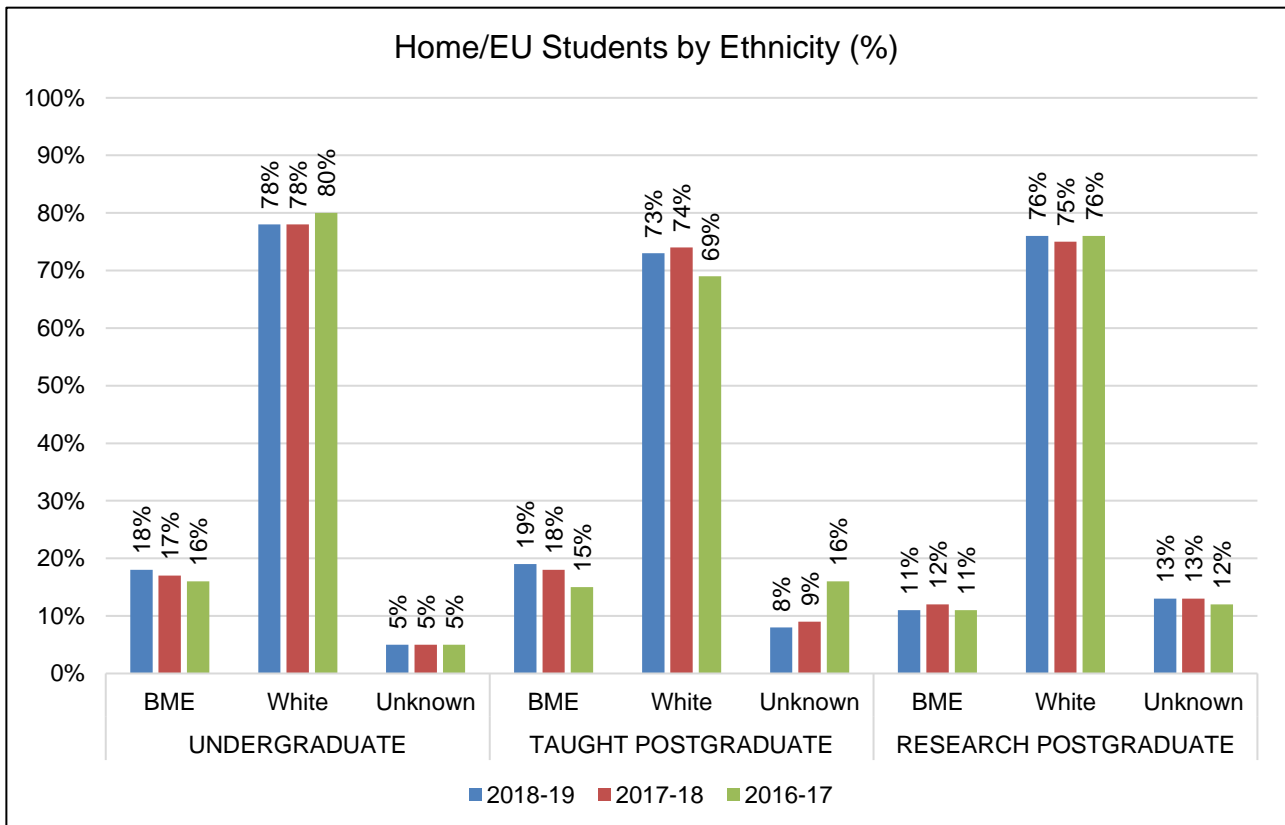

- i. Undergraduate - The percentage of Overseas UG students who have declared a disability has remained at 2% over the three year period.
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - The percentage of Overseas PGT students who have declared a disability has remained at 1% over the three year period.
- iii. Research Postgraduate - The percentage of Overseas PGR students who have declared a disability has increased by 1% over the three year period from 1% in 2016-17 to 2% in 2018-19.

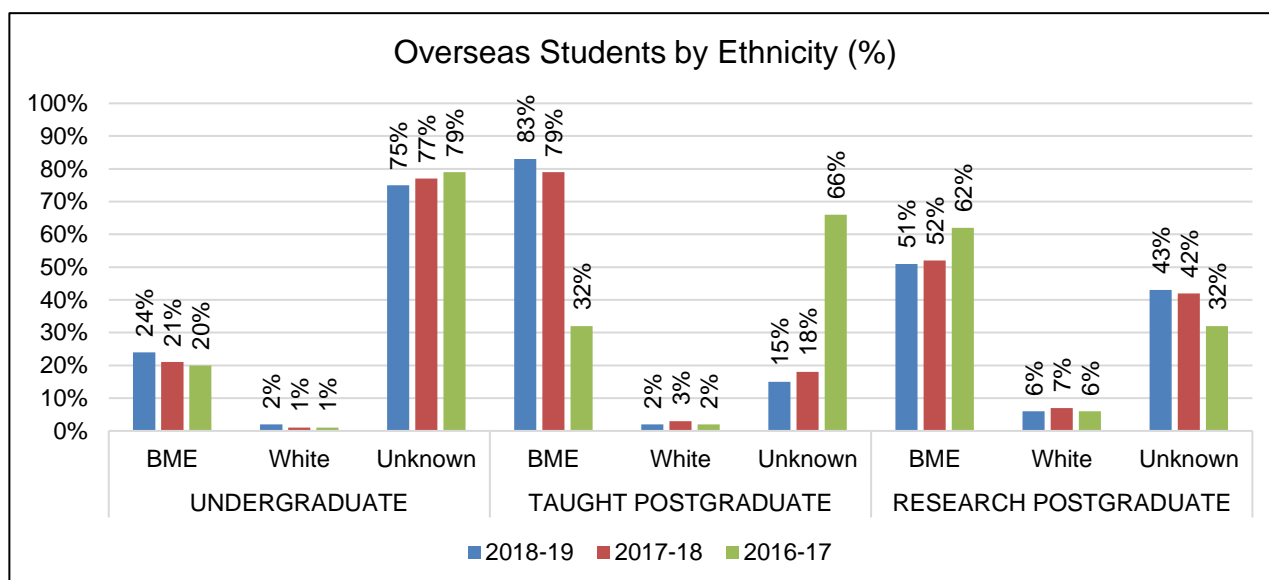
### Commentary

- i. Undergraduate - The percentage of Home/EU UG students whose ethnicity is BME<sup>2</sup> has increased by 2% over the three year period from 16% in 2016-17 to 18% in 2018-19. The level of UG students whose ethnicity is unknown has remained at 5% throughout the period.
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - The percentage of Home/EU PGT students whose ethnicity is BME has increased by 4% over the three year period from 15% in 2016-17 to 19% in 2018-19. The level of PGT students whose ethnicity is unknown has decreased by 8% over the three year period from 16% in 2016-17 to 8% in 2018-19.
- iii. Research Postgraduate - The percentage of Home/EU PGR students whose ethnicity is BME has remained unchanged from 2016-17 (11%). The level of PGR

students whose ethnicity is unknown has increased by 1% over the three year period from 12% in 2016-17 to 13% in 2018-19.

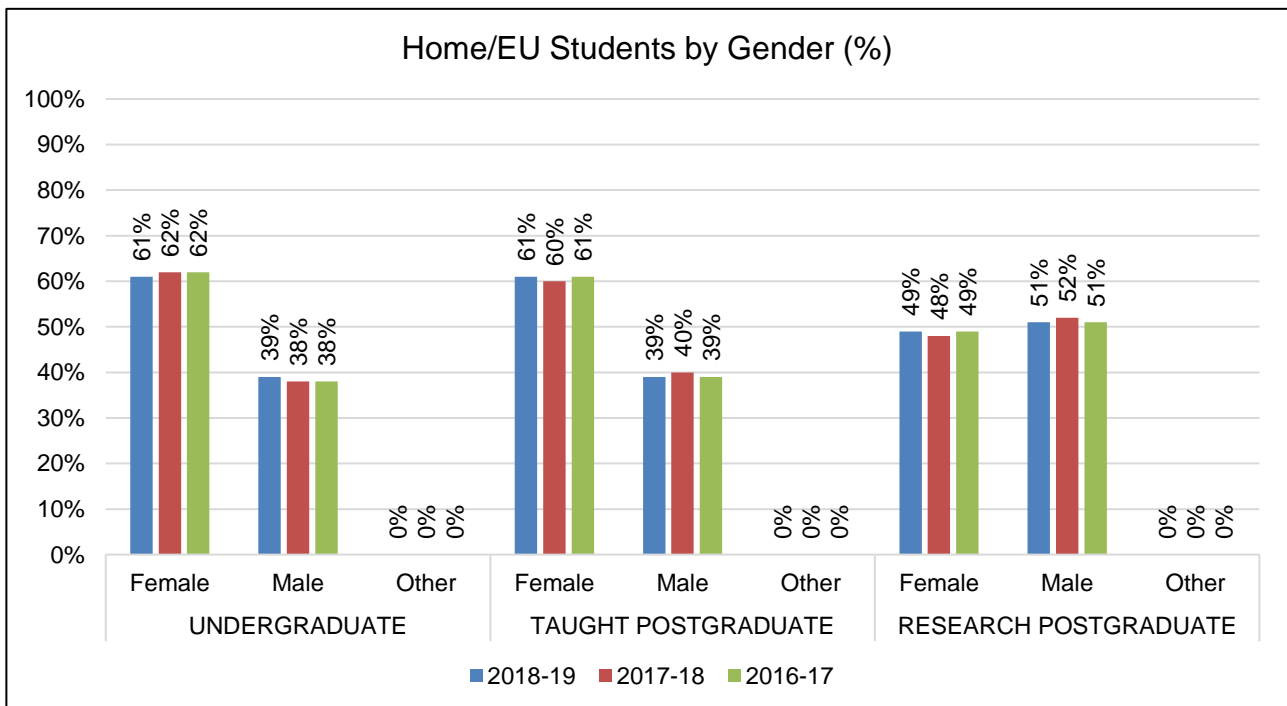

### Commentary

- i. Undergraduate - The percentage of overseas UG BME students has increased over the three year period from 20% in 2016-17 to 24% in 2018-19. The percentage of UG students whose ethnicity is unknown has decreased by 4% over the three year period.
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - Over the three year period, the percentage of unknown ethnicity data for PGT overseas students has dramatically decreased from 66% in 2016-17 to 15% in 2018-19. Whilst the percentage of white students has remained at 2%, the percentage of BME students has increased from 32% to 83% over the three year period.
- iii. Research Postgraduate - Over the three year period, the level of unknown ethnicity data relating to overseas PGR students has increased from 32% in 2016-17 to 43% in 2018-19. The percentage of BME overseas PGR students has decreased by 11% across the three year period. The level of white PGR students remains at 6% (the same as in 2016-17).

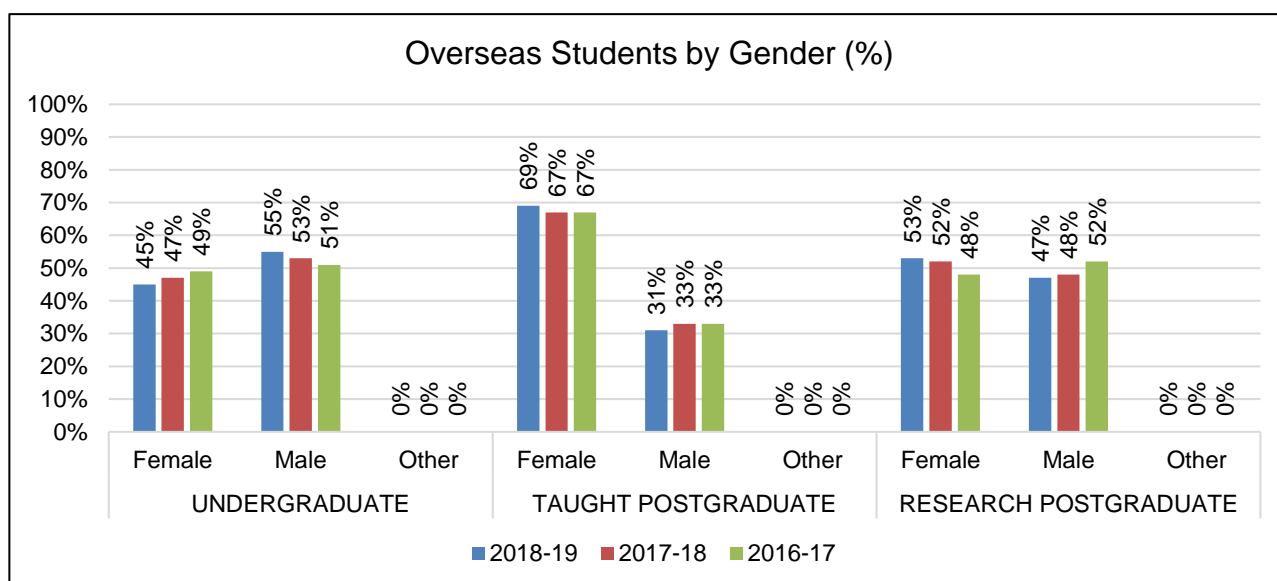

### Commentary

- i. Undergraduate - The percentage of female Home/EU UG student registrations has decreased by 1% over the three year period from 62% in 2016-17 to 61% in 2018-19. There has been a 1% increase in the number of UG male students.
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - The percentages of female and male PGT Home/EU students remains at 61% female, 39% male.
- iii. Research Postgraduate - The percentages of female and male PGR Home/EU students remains at 49% female, 51% male.

## Commentary

- i. Undergraduate - There has been a 4% decrease in the percentage of female overseas UG students over the three year period (49%, 2016-17 and 45% 2018-19). There has been a 4% increase in the percentage of male overseas UG students over the three year period.
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - There has been a 2% increase in the percentage of female overseas PGT students over the three year period (67% in 2016-17 increasing to 69% in 2018-19). There has been a 2% decrease in the percentage of male overseas PGT students.
- iii. Research Postgraduate - There has been a 5% increase in the percentage of female overseas PGR students over the three year period (from 48% in 2016-17 to 53% in 2018-19). There has been a 5% decrease in the percentage of male overseas PGR students over three year period.

## Commentary

- i. Undergraduate - The two largest groups of UG home/EU students continue to be those of no religion (44% in 2016-17 increasing to 51% in 2018-19) and Christians (27% in 2016-17 decreasing to 26% in 2018-19). The two smallest groups remain those who declared their religion as Buddhist (remaining at 0% across the three year period, but with an increase in numbers from 62 in 2016-17 to 78 in 2018-19), and those who declared their religion as Sikh (remaining at 1% across the three year period, but with an increase in actual numbers from 130 students in 2016-17 to

158 in 2018-19). The level of non-disclosure across the three year period for UG students has decreased from 19% in 2016-17 to 11% in 2018-19.

- ii. Taught Postgraduate - The two largest groups of PGT home/EU students continue to be those of no religion (35% in 2016-17 increasing to 45% in 2018-19) and Christians (31% in 2016-17 increasing to 33% in 2018-19). The three smallest groups remain those who declared their religion as Buddhist (decreasing by 1% from 1% in 2016-17 to 0% in 2018-19 (with a corresponding decrease in students from 20 in 2016-17 to eight in 2018-19) , those who declared their religion as Sikh (remaining at 1% across the three year period, but with an increase in actual numbers from 17 students in 2016-17 to 20 in 2018-19) and those who declared their religion as Jewish (remaining at 1% across the period, but with an increase in numbers of students from 17 in 2016-17 to 21 in 2018-19). The level of non-disclosure across the three year period for PGT students has decreased from 23% in 2016-17 to 8% in 2018-19.
- iii. Research Postgraduate - The two largest groups of PGR home/EU students remain those who declared themselves as having no religion (45%, 2016-17 and 53% 2018-19) and Christian students (23%, 2016-17 and 24% in 2018-19). Jewish and Sikh PGR students remain the lowest percentage student groups (at 0% across the three year period). The percentage of Buddhist students has increased from 0% 2016-17 to 1% in 2018-19. The level of non-disclosure has decreased from 20% in 2016-17 to 14% in 2018-19.

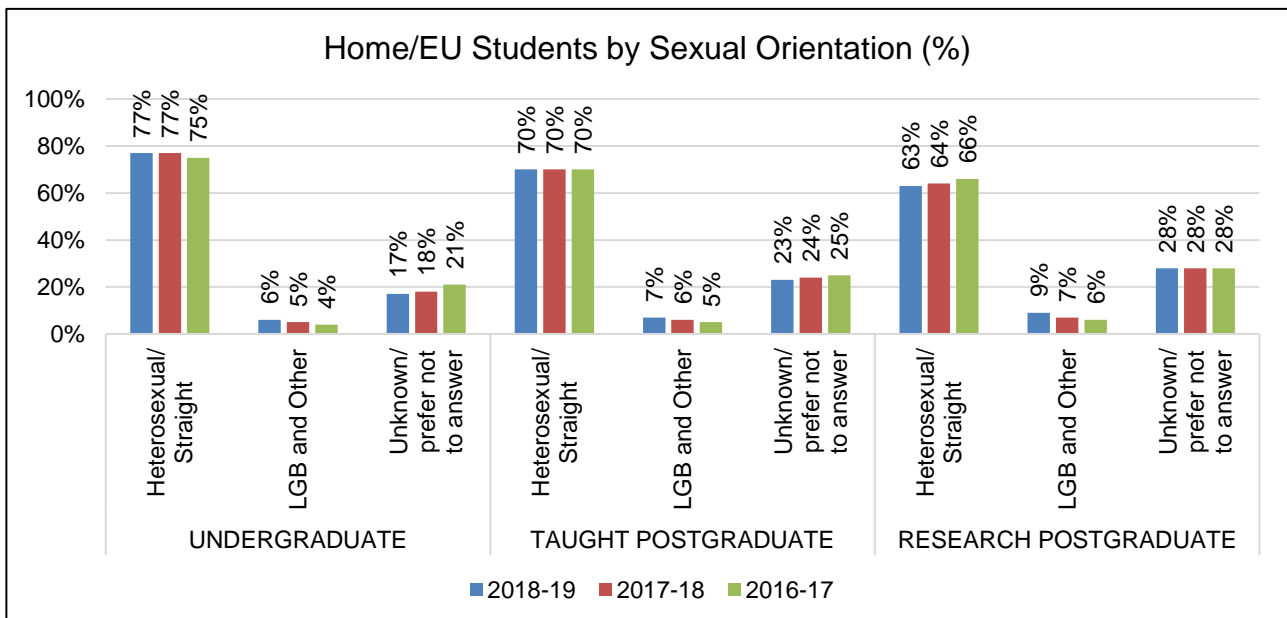
### Commentary

- i. Undergraduate - The three largest groups of UG Overseas students continue to be Muslim students (22% in 2016-17 decreasing to 20% in 2018-19) those of no religion (10% in 2016-17 increasing to 32% in 2018-19) and Christians (9% in 2016-

- 17 decreasing to 8% in 2018-19). The three smallest groups remain those who declared their religion as Jewish (remaining at 0% across the three year period), and those who declared their religion as Sikh (remaining at 0% across the three year period) and those who declared their religion or belief as Spiritual (remaining at 0% across the three year period). The level of non-disclosure across the three year period for UG students has decreased from 51% in 2016-17 to 32% in 2018-19.
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - The three largest groups of PGT overseas students continue to be those of no religion (32% in 2016-17 increasing to 68% in 2018-19), Christians (10% in 2016-17 decreasing to 7% in 2018-19) and Muslims (10% in 2016-17 decreasing to 7% in 2018-19). The three smallest groups remain those who declared their religion as Jewish (remaining at 0% across the three year period), those who declared their religion as Sikh (remaining at 0% across the three year period) and those who declared their religion as Spiritual (remaining at 0% across the three year period). The level of non-disclosure across the three year period for PGT students has decreased from 35% in 2016-17 to 7% in 2018-19.
  - iii. Research Postgraduate - The largest group of PGR overseas students remain those who declared themselves as Muslim (45%, 2016-17 and 40% 2018-19). Jewish and Sikh PGR students remain the lowest percentage student groups (at 0% across the three year period). The level of non-disclosure for overseas PGR students has decreased from 14% in 2016-17 to 6% in 2018-19.

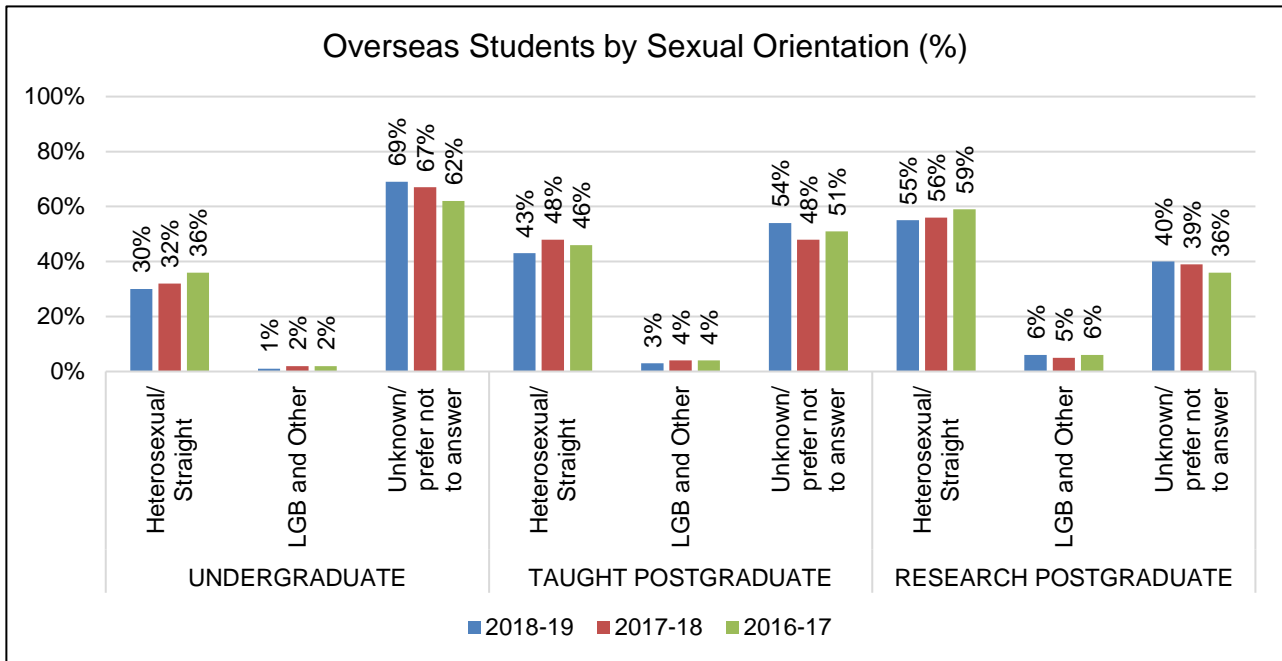

### *Commentary*

- i. Undergraduate - The percentage of Home/EU UG students who declared themselves as gay man, bisexual, lesbian or Other has increased over the three year period from 4% in 2016-17 to 6% in 2018-19. The percentage of heterosexual/straight UG students has also increased over the period from 75% in 2016-17 to 77% in 2018-19. There has been a corresponding 4% decrease in non-disclosure over the period from 21% in 2016-17 to 17% in 2018-19.
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - The percentage of gay man, bisexual, lesbian or Other Home/EU PGT students increased from 5% in 2016-17 to 7% in 2018-19. The percentage of heterosexual/straight PGT students remained at 70% across the period. The level of non-disclosure has decreased over the period from 25% in 2016-17 to 23% in 2018-19.
- iii. Research Postgraduate - The percentage of gay, bisexual, lesbian or Other Home/EU PGR students has increased over the three year period from 6% in 2016-17 to 9% in 2018-19. The level of heterosexual/straight PGR students has decreased over the three year period from 66% in 2016-17 to 63% in 2018-19. Non-disclosure has remained at 28% across the period.

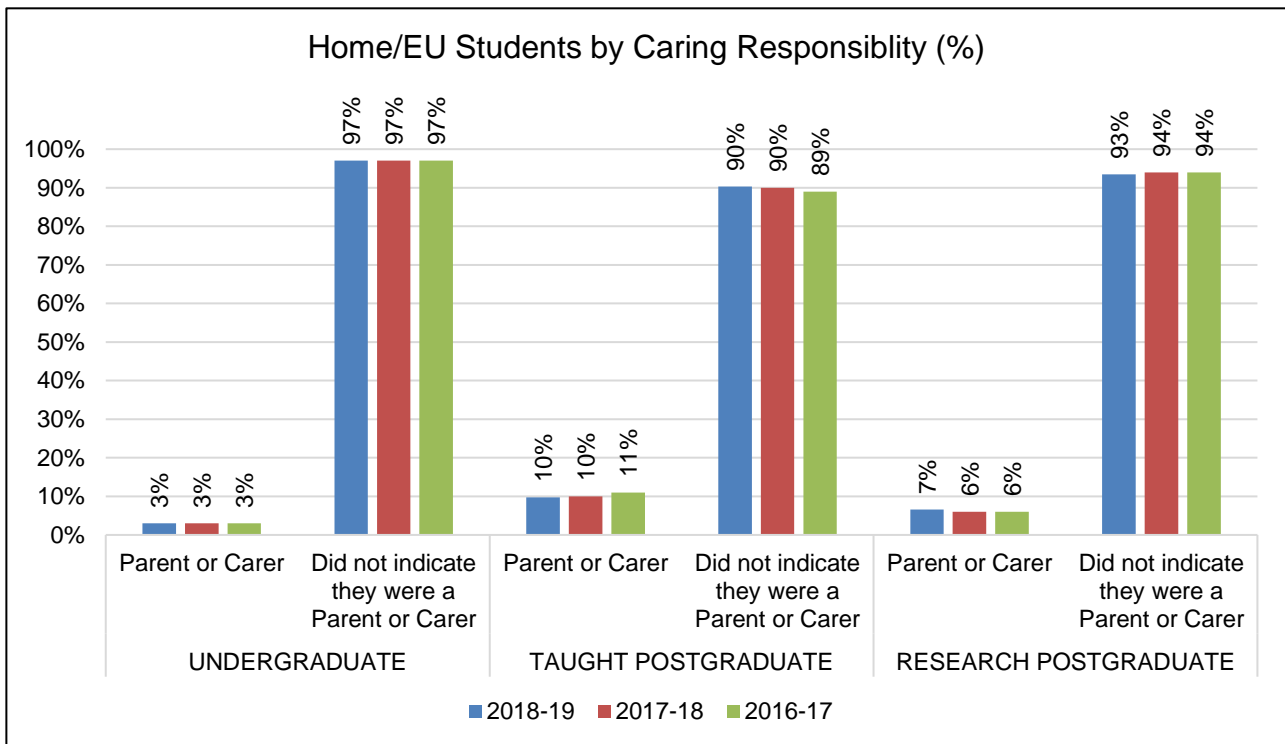
### Commentary

- i. Undergraduate - The percentage of gay man, lesbian, bisexual or Other overseas UG students has decreased over the three year period by 1% (2%, 2016-17 and 1%, 2018-19). The percentage of heterosexual/straight UG students has decreased from 36% in 2016-17 to 30% in 2018-19. There has been a 7% increase in the percentage of non-disclosure over the three year period from 62% in 2016-17 to 69% in 2018-19.
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - There has been a 1% decrease over the three year period of PGT overseas students who declared their sexual orientation as gay man, lesbian, bisexual or Other (4% in 2016-17 decreasing to 3% in 2018-19). The percentage of heterosexual/straight PGT students has also decreased from 46% in 2016-17 to 43% in 2018-19. There has been a 3% increase in non-disclosure from 51% in 2016-17 to 54% in 2018-19.

- iii. Research Postgraduate - The percentage of overseas PGR students who declared their sexual orientation as gay man, lesbian, bisexual or Other remains, as in 2016-17, at 6% (please note this displays as 5% in the above chart due to the rounding of data to the nearest whole percent). The percentage of heterosexual/straight PGR students has decreased from 59% in 2016-17 to 55% in 2018-19. Non-disclosure has increased over the three year period from 36% in 2016-17 to 40% in 2018-19.

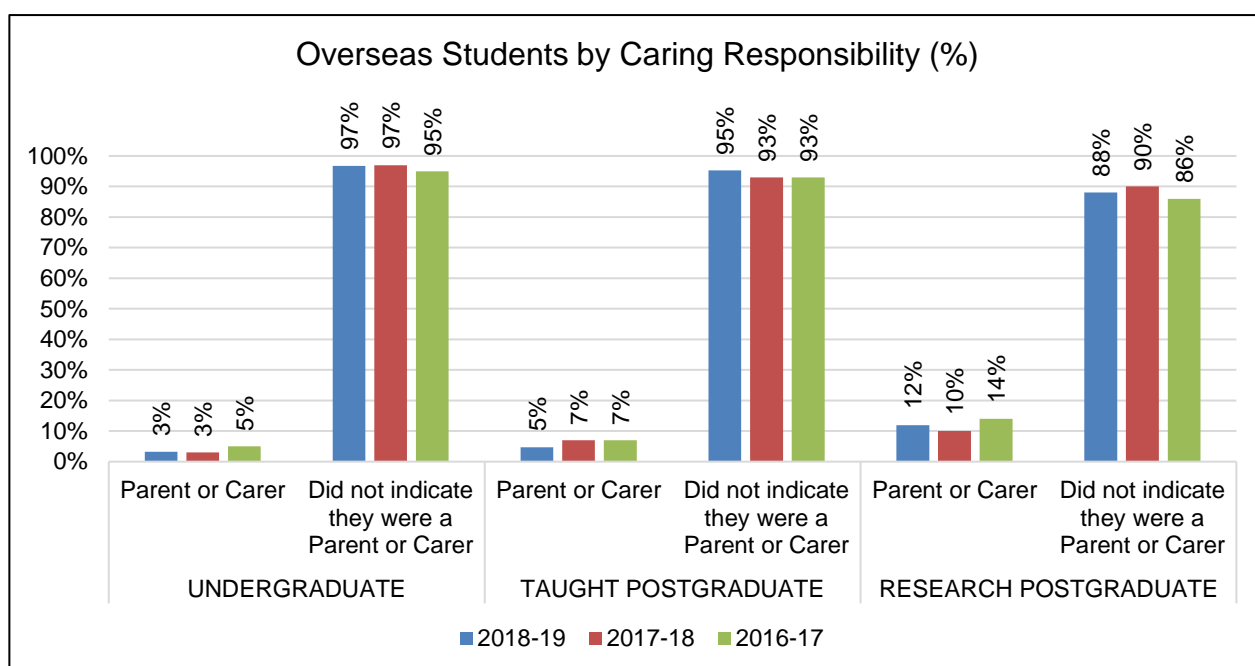

*Commentary*

- i. Undergraduate - The percentage of UG Home/EU students who declared that they had caring responsibilities remained at 3% across the three year period.
- ii. Taught Postgraduate - The percentage of PGT Home/EU students who declared that they had caring responsibilities has decreased by 1% over the three year period from 11% in 2016/17 to 10% in 2018-19.
- iii. Research Postgraduate - The percentage of PGR Home/EU students who declared that they had caring responsibilities increased by 1% over the three year period from 6% in 2016-17 to 7% in 2018-19.

- i. Undergraduate - The percentage of UG overseas students who declared that they had a caring responsibility decreased by 2% over the three year period from 5% in 2016-17 to 3% in 2018-19.

- ii. Taught Postgraduate - The percentage of PGT overseas students who declared that they had a caring responsibility decreased by 2% over the three year period from 7% in 2016-17 to 5% in 2018-19.
